In the novel "Of Mice And Men ", Steinbeck presents the bunkhouse as being very hostile and unfriendly through the use of adjectives, "the walls were whitewashed and the floor unpainted". This portrays the simple nature of the bunkhouse and it's only purpose: housing the ranch hands.

So, what is the difference between a screenplay and a film novel? Screenplays indicate solely what the audience is to see or hear on screen. Film novels are short, and take about as long to read as a feature film takes to watch. The description, dialogue, and narration of a film novel can simply be lifted out and used as the description, dialogue, and voice-over narration for a script. The author has devised a fifteen week program starting from a one-sentence pitch to the novel itself, which includes filming a scene from your script/novel. He grounds the discussion of early film novels, like *The Maltese Falcon*, *Of Mice and Men*, and *The Misfits*, to provide historical and theoretical background while detailing the practical, sequential approach for completing a short novel and script.
